
Food Truck Business Licensing Checklist

Step 1: Research Local Regulations

- Familiarize with local zoning laws and restrictions.
- Identify required permits and licenses, such as a mobile food vendor permit.
- Understand local health codes and inspection requirements.
- Resources:
 - Local city/county health department website
 - Chamber of Commerce
 - Small Business Administration (SBA)

Step 2: Choose a Business Structure

- Evaluate business structure options:

Step 3: Register Your Business

- Select a unique business name and check its availability.

- Obtain an Employer Identification Number (EIN) from the IRS if hiring employees.

- Contact your city or county clerk’s office for specific requirements.
- Complete necessary forms and pay required fees.

Step 5: Obtain a Food Service License

- Apply for a food service license through the local/state health department.
- Prepare for a health inspection of the food truck.

Step 6: Secure a Health Department Permit

- Pass inspection and address any violations.

Step 7: Acquire Additional Permits and Licenses

- Verify need for a Mobile Food Permit (Food Truck Permit).
- Secure a Parking Permit for approved areas.
- Research additional special permits (e.g., noise permits, event permits).
- Obtain a Fire Permit and perform regular fire safety inspections.
- Ensure vehicle compliance and valid driver's license for commercial operation.
